






# **Imagine Udny: Community Action Plan**

This document is to be read in conjunction with the Imagine Udny Spatial Masterplan, which illustrates the actions as separate spatial/location based projects, and the Appendices document, which contains a record of supporting material and findings from the Imagine Udny Charretteplus® process.

Thanks to the residents of Udny, Udny Community Trust, community groups, Pitmedden and Udny Green primary schools, Meldrum Academy, local youth groups and businesses, councillors and Aberdeenshire Council officers involved in the 'Imagine Udny' engagement process – whose enthusiasm, help and input were vital to its success and to delivering what can now happen as a result.

The Udny Community Trust commissioned and helped realise this Imagine Udny Action Plan with the support of PAS. As a culmination of previous engagement activities this Imagine Udny charrette process, undertaken in Pitmedden in 2018, creates a shared vision and workable action

plan to help address local development growth

issues and community needs comprehensively.

Imagine Udny brought together key partners such as Aberdeenshire Council, local landowners, and community representatives to help ensure that new development and initiatives happened with the community. The process inspired imagination and conversation.

The plan firstly outlines the community engagement approach taken in Imagine Udny, and the subsequent evidence base that was gathered to inform the

Imagine Udny plan (Section 2). A wide variety of ideas were gathered from the process, with these then being tested in various community forums to identify preferences and how they may be considered alongside other actions and initiatives.

Section 3 then documents a broad strategy and vision for the plan, and the various actions that were suggested and supported by the community. The action table in Section 3 serves as a comprehensive list and, where possible, these actions have been incorporated within distinct location focused projects. These 'spatial projects' are detailed in illustrative and conceptual form in the supporting Imagine Udny Spatial Masterplan.



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# 2 Approach and Purpose

The Imagine Udny Action Plan outlines the aspirations of the Pitmedden and wider Udny community for the next 10 years. Local residents and stakeholders proposed the actions contained within this plan, and these were gathered by PAS on behalf of Udny Community Trust in late 2018 using the PAS Charretteplus® community engagement process.

PAS's Charretteplus® programme is where the community sets the agenda for change, it focuses specifically on aligning spatial planning with community planning. The aim of Charretteplus is to work with the whole community to find out what their priorities are, create a shared vision for their place and a realistic community plan to achieve change.

It is envisaged that this plan will be used to influence the local statutory planning process, and may be seen as a Local Place Plan, bringing together residents, local elected representatives, community groups, Aberdeenshire Council and support partners to deliver and realise a shared vision for Udny's future.

# 3 Imagining Udny Context Setting

### **Pitmedden**

Udny (pop. 2242) is a parish in the Formartine district of Aberdeenshire, and consists of the rural settlements of Hattoncrook, Pitmedden and Udny Green. The largest of these, Pitmedden (pop. 1444), is approximately 15 miles north of Aberdeen, and is notable for the extensive National Trust for Scotland owned garden and estate that surround Pitmedden House. Given Pitmedden's proximity to Aberdeen it is a commuter village with high rates of car ownership and private housing.

Udny Community Trust, who commissioned this work, had identified that there were particular challenges for the future of Pitmedden. These relate to physical issues such as two busy roads passing through the village, pressure for new development, and the disjointedness of community spaces and facilities. However, Pitmedden is closely related to the wider community of Udny, providing a wider range of facilities and services than in the other Udny villages. It was therefore important to the Trust that Pitmedden should not be looked at in isolation. In some cases the themes which emerged through the process relate to this wider Udny context, others relate more specifically to Pitmedden.

### **Evidence Gathering**

The context setting and evidence gathering stage of Imagine Udny involved desk based studies and research as well as stakeholder engagement with key community groups, elected members, and related planning partners. These activities helped determine key issues relevant to the Pitmedden and surrounding Udny area.

Previous engagement outcomes, planning documents, and various reports and appraisals pertinent to the area were researched. Alongside this, multiple meetings were convened with key individuals and groups to clarify and document any new or existing issues. Key findings from this stage informed the planning and coordination of the Charrette design stage and workshop themes.

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## What you said

## Connectivity

(Udny wide)

Health and wellbeing concerns and unrealised tourism opportunities were raised and these were directly linked to access to walking and cycling in the area. Possible solutions were given, including improving the condition of path networks, the connectivity/continuity of different paths, and accessibility for different path users (e.g. cyclists, walkers, wheelchair users).

Better promotion and navigation of the path network was also seen as key, along with lighting in parts to address personal safety concerns.

Congestion on roads and general road safety were seen as an issue, particularly for pedestrians/active travel users.

Insufficient parking was seen as an issue in Pitmedden village, for both cars and cyclists, and this was linked to congestion. Solutions included providing more carparks, and bike storage facilities within the central area.

There were general concerns about isolation and reduced independence for residents without private transport, particularly those wishing to travel east to west (Ellon to Inverurie). More frequent, better coordinated, and better-connected public transport were issues raised by many.

## **Community Facilities**

(Udny wide with focus on Pitmedden)

There was a need for a new multi-functional and multi-generational hub, to include toddler and youth provision, health and wellbeing facilities, a possible post office and pharmacy, community cinema, learn to cook facilities, church space, and a community café. The earmarked local plan site was questioned as the best location for this hub, with a need to consider other alternatives.

There was a need to better manage and coordinate the use, maintenance, and long term state of repair of existing assets such as the Pitmedden Village Hall and Church.

Issues of anti-social behaviour in Pitmedden Park were raised, and a lack of play facilities for early age groups was noted. There was a need to improve play and recreational facilities for both children and young people, and repurpose existing settlement spaces to do this, e.g. quarry, Pitmedden Hall and the skatepark.

There was a need to improve physical access for disabled and less mobile residents to public buildings such as Pitmedden Primary School.

## **Your Village**

(Udny wide with focus on Pitmedden)

It was felt that Pitmedden had a strong sense of community, which had helped realise significant local projects, e.g. 'Tilly'.

There was a need to improve digital connectivity to address issues such as isolation, and barriers to local business initiatives.

It was felt that the local economy and job opportunities could be improved through new tourism, retail, and promotion of existing attractions such as Pitmedden Garden, and local hospitality with a food focus.

There was a need to address local housing issues: the lack of diversity of house types, affordable homes, and the location of future housing development. It was felt this could be community led. There was broad acceptance of a need to develop more housing, but that this needed to be proportionate.


It was felt that the overall sustainability of the village could be improved by addressing greenspace accessibility and provision, allotment availability, and energy consumption.

There was a lack of a coherent centre in Pitmedden, with the suggestion of a central square.

There was a need to identify opportunities to take ownership of local infrastructural needs (e.g. schools, heating) and development (e.g. housing, retail) through community land ownership and development.









## **Visioning**

Workshops were conducted in November and December 2018. The first set of these consisted of four workshops, held at the Pitmedden Village Hall, and attended by approximately 130 participants over three days. Participants were asked to reflect on some of the broad themes that had emerged from previous engagement, and pre-charrette activities held in the two months prior. At the four workshops participants were then asked to consider proposals that had come through recent engagement exercises (e.g. The Udny Survey), offer new ideas where necessary, and lastly, to determine who would deliver any particular idea and over what time frame. This resulted in a set of proposals that the Imagine Udny team developed for further testing in a return workshop.

November workshop proposals included:

- a new community hub at one of six different potential locations across Pitmedden
- various new walking and cycling paths alongside signage/wayfinding and a path network map
- new play facilities
- a new central square area
- various traffic calming measures and pedestrian crossings
- village gateways
- a recreational park at the existing quarry site
- a newly established green space at the southerly entrance of Pitmedden.

## Action

The return workshop event, held in early December at the Pitmedden Village Hall, was attended by 58 residents. Participants were able to indicate their preferred location for a new community hub, with the majority showing a preference to place the hub near or around the Haddo Medical Centre. The event also offered an opportunity to comment on the proposals and ideas which had been worked up by the Imagine Udny team.

There was clear support for a focused effort to create a central Pitmedden Village area in and around the Pitmedden School and current Pitmedden Village Hall, for a new green space/wetland adjacent to the southerly entrance of Pitmedden, and for the re-purposing of the disused Quarry as a site for recreational bike use and local industry. In addition there appeared to be strong support for a better connected path network, and for the community to be more involved in the growth of Pitmedden through land acquisition and development.

The ideas listed in Section 3 are a comprehensive list of all the proposals that emerged throughout Imagine Udny. The priority projects have been developed into more detailed proposals in the Imagine Udny Spatial Masterplan which should be read in conjunction with this Action Plan.

The final stage of this process will involve the coordination and delivery of the various proposals and ideas found in the Action Plan. This will require close working between local elected representatives, the Udny Community Council, landowners, the Udny Community Trust, support partners, funding bodies, and Aberdeenshire Council.

Udny Community Trust has a clear aspiration that the Imagine Udny process and plans influence the planning and decision making of those bodies in control of the planning and development process.

The ultimate outcomes Udny Community Trust expect to see are the realisation of the vision set out in Section 3 of this Action Plan and an approach to development overall that recognises these reports are the communities' statement of intent for the future development of Pitmedden and Udny.



# 4 Action Plan

The proposals and actions contained within this section are the final result of the Imagine Udny process, as outlined in Sections 2 and 3. These initiatives may be seen as discrete actions, and they have also been combined, in some instances, to form broader spatial projects; these are outlined in more detail in the accompanying Spatial Masterplan.

## **Vision and Strategy**

#### **AIM**

The aim is to grow Pitmedden in a considered and self-determined way to create a sustainable and well-connected Udny with a strong sense of community


#### VISION

Pitmedden is welcoming and accessible, integrated and interconnected, active and dynamic, community driven and a physically and mentally healthy place.

#### SETTLEMENT STATEMENT

That Pitmedden develop and grow with a focus on two spatial nodes of activity:

- 1. The central Pitmedden School and Pitmedden Hall (known as Pitmedden Central)
- 2. The area surrounding the Haddo Medical centre, and areas adjacent to the B999 towards Milldale.



#### **CONNECTIVITY objectives**

To improve health and well-being, biodiversity, and access to and from the village, path network and beyond

#### **PRIORITIES**

- Bring together paths through a strategic approach.
- Improve accessibility for all specifically for people with disabilities and those with dementia.
- Improve road / pedestrian safety by considering pedestrian priority and traffic calming measures; link improvements to the introduction of a new central square (traffic and public realm improvements)
- Improve public transport
- Support sustainable active and motorised travel



#### **COMMUNITY FACILITIES Objectives**

To facilitate and encourage community/ social interaction, health and well-being

#### **PRIORITIES**

- Create one place/hub which is multipurpose, multifunctional, multigenerational, flexible and owned by the community.
- Repurpose Pitmedden Village Hall for all generations
- Purchase land surrounding village for the community to develop themselves – and foster relationships between business/developers and the community
- Provide adequate children's and young people's outdoor play facilities for present and future Pitmedden.
- Improve and better use existing local facilities.
- Encourage economic and social sustainability to help build community capacity, skills and resilience.



#### **VILLAGE IDENTITY Objectives**

To enhance the village centre and surrounds, and give it a distinct identity and sense of arrival

#### **PRIORITIES**

- Create a new public central square 'show stopper' to make the village centre recognisable.
- Create a sense of arrival
- Develop a Green Network to improve outdoor use of greenspaces, biodiversity, flood mitigation.
- Celebrate the history of the Udny region
- Pride in place
- Promote an area identity and plan for village growth



## **Action Plan**

The proposals contained within this plan are detailed further in the table below. For ease of reference each proposal is attributed with the following details:

- **Projects:** A number of these initiatives were brought together to form comprehensive spatial, location-based projects, that may be undertaken in stages or comprehensively. These are detailed further in the Imagine Udny Spatial Masterplan.
- Themes: the drivers behind each proposal, linked to the plan's objectives, vision and aim (refer to strategic vision section).
- *Timescale:* Based on the level of priority determined by residents, and the development time required to deliver the project. Short term refers to anytime from now to 2020, medium term refers to 2020 to 2022, long term refers to 2022 onward.
- Delivery: Agencies and partners that may be involved in delivering any given proposal.
